## 'Leaves are falling, Autumn is calling'

As autumn makes way for winter, Lincolnshire has experienced the first blast of icy cold conditions. Did you know that 2024 has been recorded as the warmest on record according to climate experts? Another unusual phenomenon this autumn has been the appearance of the Northern Lights which were visible on Friday 11th October. ## **Parish Council News**

The autumn meeting was held on Tuesday 12th November at the Victory Hall in Partney. Thank you to all households who completed the Parish Council questionnaire, which was delivered to residents over the summer months. All your comments/views are extremely useful in helping to prioritise the council's future plans and provide a focus for actions. The information, once collated, will also help to get an insight into what residents would like to see in the parish. In total 25% of households returned the questionnaire. Once the information is analysed it will form an excellent starting point for the **Parish Council Action Plan**. This will be shared, either at a special event or prior to a Parish Council meeting. Understanding local needs and aspirations supports the council in applying for funding and gives greater impact to communication with other organisations, such as ELDC and the County Council.

### **Darker Sky Initiative**

An agenda item for discussion at the meeting was a darker skies proposal for the village of Partney. The aim of the proposal is the reduction of light pollution. A detailed report was prepared by Councillor Packa Risi and shared with those in attendance at the meeting. The rationale behind the darker skies initiative is to reduce artificial light, particularly in rural locations such as ours. Partney village can be described as rural outlier with over 75 street lights from the village perimeter. The darker skies initiative is **not** about turning all the street lights off, but rather looking at the effects of artificial light, which shines where it is neither wanted nor needed. It would mean the council examining all future planning applications to ensure that the lighting planned is sensitive to our rural location. There is increasing awareness of the benefits of darker skies, this includes enhancements to health, as too much light can affect sleep patterns. In addition, turning off or dimming unnecessary lights can save lots of energy and reduce carbon emissions. Research has shown that too much light can affect the breeding cycles and feeding habits of many animals, including birds, bats and moths. By turning off unnecessary lights the natural beauty of the night sky can be truly revealed. Many of the lights, particularly along Spilsby Road, were installed when the entrance to the village formed part of the A158, before the construction of the bypass. Following a discussion it was agreed to seek the expert advice of the County Council's streetlighting team. We will continue to keep residents informed of all future developments. You may be aware that as part of the statutory health and safety requirements of running a cemetery the Parish Council are required to carry out a topple test. This has identified a number of unsafe headstones/memorials. Thank you to those residents who have already taken actions to repair family memorials. A gravestone's maintenance is the responsibility of the family who purchased the grave. The Parish Council is currently seeking to contact the relatives of the following headstones in need of repair. If families cannot be contacted the possible option is to lay it flat on the ground. We are seeking the families of the following memorials. Many readers will be aware that there are a couple of books written about the history of Partney. The first was written in 1898 by Reverend Gilbert George Walker who was the Rector of Partney at the time. Entitled **Historical Notes On the Parish Of Partney**, the book covers the history of the village from ancient times. Copies can be found on sale on internet auction sites. The second book, written by Mick Lovelock, details the lives of the 55 men associated with the village who served in the Great War and whose names appear on the Memorial Scroll in St. Nicholas Church- rare unsigned copies can still be found!! Mick has continued, his historical research and is currently researching a book on the history of the village from 1900 to 1914 ( the period between the two books). Much of the content has come from old newspaper cuttings from the period, which coves everything from adverts to cases held in the Spilsby Magistrates Court . It makes for really interesting reading, as we learn about the exploits of Partney and Dalby characters from the past. Below is a small extract. Happy reading!

## **Football Goes Wrong**

A group of lads employed by Morton's the Printers of Spilsby were caught playing football on the highway. Amongst them was Harry Blakey of Partney, who would go on to serve his country in the Great War. The boys appeared at the Police Court on Monday 9th February where all charges were withdrawn on payment of 2s 6d costs by each lad . The Morton's Dinner Hour Football Club was disbanded.



On the 30th January the Stamford Mercury carried an announcement of an auction to be held at Spilsby Market on 2nd February to sell a Horsebreaker's Skeleton Pair Horse Brake the property of Adolphus Cobb, a horsebreaker who lived near Partney Mill. Originally a Brake was used for 'breaking' or training teams of horses. It was a carriage with a skeleton frame and a heavy undercarriage., with hardly any body construction on top ( right handside photo). The undercarriage was like that of a coach using a long pole ( called a perch) to connect the front and back axles. Around the middle of the of the 19th Century it became more common to put a wagonette body





onto the break undercarriage. This was then called a body break and was used not only for training horses but also carrying up to 16 passengers and luggage!

Researching the past certainly provides us with an insight to how we once lived and worked!!
